100 Fire Suppression Classes

CLASS 101:

BASIC FIREFIGHTING

This 2 day class will be held on Saturday and Sunday. In this course we offer you 16 of the first 20 hours that a firefighter must have before they can respond to a scene. Full turnout gear and SCBA are required.

CLASS 102:

JUNIOR FIREFIGHTING CLASS (Explorer)

This 2 day course will be held on both Saturday and Sunday. You will receive hands on training in Ropes, Personal protective equipment, SCBA and other basic training topics. Bring a letter from your fire chief giving permission for you to train. Bring turnout gear if you have it available to you.

CLASS 103:

BLOCKS OF HARD TO GET HOURS

This is an 8 hours class on Saturday or Sunday. Here is a chance for you to obtain some of the categories that are sometimes hard to get, but you must have to become a certified firefighter. Take the entire course or choose only to take the hours that you need.

CLASS 104:

FIREFIGHTER SURVIVAL

This is an 8 hour course and will be offered on Saturday only. This course will emphasize on the removal of trapped or unconscious firefighters from a burning building and self rescue techniques when the primary escape route is blocked. This is a required course for all new firefighters in Kentucky. Full turnout gear and SCBA are required.

CLASS 105:

FIREFIGHTER RESCUE

This is an 8 hour course and will be offered on Sunday only. This course is designed to teach you how to rescue fellow firefighters from a burning structure. Special techniques are used for the rescue portion. This is a required course for all new firefighters in Kentucky. The completion of FF survival is a prerequisite for this course. Full turnout gear and SCBA are required.

CLASS 106:

WILDLAND URBAN INTERFACE

This 4 hour session will be held on Saturday and Sunday afternoon. This course offers the 4 hour Wildland Firefighting class that is required to become a certified firefighter in Kentucky.

CLASS 107:

PUMPER MAINTENANCE

This is a 2 day course which will be held on both Saturday and Sunday. This course will cover the proper maintenance procedure for pumping apparatus. It is designed to help you develop a working knowledge of fire pumps and maintain your apparatus in the most serviceable condition possible. This is a hands-on class which requires work clothes.

CLASS 108:

NFIRS 5.0

This is a 4 hour course offered on Sunday morning and Sunday afternoon only. Class limited to 28 per session. This class filled up early last year so we have added an additional session for Saturday afternoon. NFIRS 5.0 is an improved National Fire Incident Reporting System which has been designed as a tool for fire departments to report and maintain computerized records of fires and other fire department incidents in a uniform manner. In this class students will learn how to register, download, and install NFIRS 5.0. Instruction will be provided for entering department, personnel, and apparatus information and also instructions for filling out the basic incident report. Students will learn how to enter different types of incidents such as Structure Fire, EMS, Haz-Mat, and other types of incidents that fire departments will encounter. Fire departments who have or plan to apply for a FEMA grant must be reporting with this system.

CLASS 109:

PIPELINE EMERGENCIES

This is an 8 hour course offered on Saturday or Sunday. Topics to be covered include the primary regulations and standards that govern pipeline operations and influence pipeline design and construction, as well as the basic principles of both liquid and gas pipeline system operations, including common products and their associated physical and chemical properties. Tactical procedures for pipeline incidents will be reviewed.

CLASS 110:

ARSON 2

This 2-day course is a comprehensive course with emphasis on techniques to determine the cause and origin of fires. Actual arson case scenarios will be incorporated to enhance this class. A wide variety of expertise is brought together through the cooperation of local, state and federal fire and police officials to provide the student with excellent instruction and detail.

CLASS 111:

HOW TO SURVIVE A KENTUCKY FIRE COMMISSION AUDIT

This is an 8 hour course which will be held on Saturday and Sunday. This course will go over the training requirements set forth by the Kentucky Fire Commission along with what is expected of the fire service instructor as far as training hours and record keeping is concerned. It will also cover the requirements for a department to receive incentive and state aid.

CLASS 112:

NIMS—ICS FOR THE FIRE SERVICE (NFA)

This is a 2 day National Fire Academy class that is designed to develop an understanding of the Incident Command System (ICS) and its application in both emergency and non-emergency situations. This course addresses the need for an ICS, an overview of the structure and flexibility of ICS, and an understanding of the command skills necessary to function effectively in an ICS structure.

LEADERSHIP I: STRATEGIES FOR COMPANY SUCCESS

(NFA COURSE)

The Students will learn to:

- Differentiate among the four decision making styles identified.
- Match appropriate decision making styles to given situations using the Vroom-Yetton model.
- Cite the advantages and potential disadvantages of group decision making.

SAFETY OFFICER CLASS (NFA)

This 2 day National Fire Academy class examines the Safety Officer's role at emergency responses. A specific focus on operations within an Incident Command System (ICS) as a

Safety Officer is a main theme. Response to all-hazards type of situations will be emphasized.

[UNDERSTANDING THE ISO FIRE SUPPRESSION RATING SCHEDULE](#)

Achieving community cost savings and winning public support may be as simple as making minor changes to how your community prepares their public fire defenses. Join members of the Insurance Services Office field staff as they provide the tools and resources needed to improve your community's ISO rating. In this important course you will learn about the Insurance Services Office including a historical perspective of previous grading schedules. An overview of the current Fire Suppression Rating Schedule will be presented. All grading items and the individual weighting assignments in fire alarm, fire department and water supply will be covered. The establishment of needed fire flows and their importance throughout the grading process will be emphasized. Public Protection Class 9 and the individual property fire suppression evaluations will be explained. Important correlation between insurer loss experience and public protection classifications is included. An example of commercial and personal lines insurance rate analysis relative to PPC will be explained as well as how to interpret the PPC numbers. Participants will also receive a copy of the FSRS and be shown the tools ISO can provide in preparation for an evaluation. Ample time will be reserved for questions and answers. This is an 8 hour class offered on Saturday only.

Class 116:

ICS 100 & 200

This is a 4 hour course that will cover the ICS 100 and 200 levels offered on Saturday morning. These courses are required for each First Responder in order for your department to be eligible for Federal funding. ICS 100, Introduction to the Incident Command System, introduces the Incident Command System (ICS) and provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. This course describes the history, features and principles, and organizational structure of the Incident Command System. It also explains the relationship between ICS and the National Incident Management System (NIMS).

ICS 200 is designed to enable personnel to operate efficiently during an incident or event within the Incident Command System (ICS). ICS 200 provides training on and resources for personnel who are likely to assume a supervisory position within the ICS.

Class 117:

ICS 800 NATIONAL RESPONSE PLAN

This is a 4 hour course that will be offered on Saturday afternoon. The course is required for all supervisory personnel so as to receive Federal funding. This course introduces you to the NRP, including the concept of operations upon which the plan is built, roles and responsibilities of the key players, and the organizational structures used to manage these resources. The NRP provides a framework to ensure that we can all work together when our Nation is threatened. The course is designed for DHS and other Federal department/agency staff responsible for implementing the NRP, as well as State, local and private sector emergency management professionals.

Purpose of the course is to introduce the NRP, so that students can:

- (A) describe the purpose of the NRP,**
- (B) locate information within the NRP,**
- (C) describe the roles and responsibilities of entities as specified in the NRP,**
- (D) identify the organizational structure used for NRP coordination,**
- (E) describe the field-level organizations and teams activated under the NRP, and**
- (F) identify the incident management activities addressed by the NRP**

200 Rescue Classes

CLASS 201:

ROPE RESCUE (RAPPELLING)

This 2 day class will be held on both Saturday and Sunday. In this course we offer you 16 hours of rope rescue. The student will learn rope construction, rope rescue hardware, knots used in rappelling along with some rope rescue commands. The instructors will accept students from every level. So it doesn't matter if you are a beginner or an advanced student. Come to learn and to also have some fun! Leather gloves, a helmet with a chin strap and leather boots are required.

CLASS 202:

FARM RESCUE/ATV SAFETY

This is a 2 day course offered on Saturday and Sunday. This course is designed to educate the rescuer on the proper techniques of real life rural and urban emergencies. Classroom instruction will cover scenarios such as: Safely removing livestock from an emergency scene, heavy equipment rescues, techniques for setting up a landing zone, and many more. Students will become familiar with different types of farming equipment. Students will be trained with hands-on scenarios involving various types of rural and urban farming equipment. Also the new ATV Safety class will be incorporated to include all safety aspects of ATV's. Helmets, eye protection, extrication jumpsuits/turnout gear, gloves, and boots required.

Class 203:

RAILROAD RESCUE

This is an 8 hour class offered on both Saturday and Sunday. The class will cover the hazardous materials that you will encounter on CSX engines, safety around the engines while doing fire suppression and rescue of injured personnel. 300 Specialty Classes

CLASS 301:

METH LAB

This is a 4 hour course and will be held on Saturday and Sunday mornings. This is a unique 4 hour Hazardous materials training dealing with Meth labs. This class will enable the student to identify a Meth lab and recognize the chemicals used in its production. It will also inform the student of the dangers they may face when exposed to a lab. Topics for discussion will include: The history of Meth Labs, the dangers that a firefighter faces, basic cooking methods and who and when to call for help. This class will be taught by the Department of Criminal Justice Training.

CLASS 302:

CRIME SCENE PRESERVATION

This class is 4 hours and will be held on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. This course will enable the student to preserve evidence found at a crime scene. Also it will teach the student what to do and what not to do as far as crime scenes go. This class will be taught by the Department of Criminal Justice Training. Types of evidence to preserve include: impressions including fingerprints, tool marks, footwear, fabric impressions, tire marks and bite marks. Forensic Biology includes blood, semen, body fluids, hair, nail scrapings, blood stain patterns, trace evidence includes gun shot residues, arson accelerant, paint, glass and fibers. Firearms include weapons, gun powder patterns, casings, projectiles, fragments, pellets, wadding and cartridges.

400 Emergency Medical Services Classes

CLASS 401:

**FIRST RESPONDER AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL
TECHNICIAN CONTINUING EDUCATION**

This 2 day course will be held on both Saturday and Sunday. These are the 16 hours required to recertify under both the State and National Registry. You may take all 16 hours or just the hours you need.

Class 402:

PARAMEDIC CONTINUING EDUCATION CLASS

This is a 4 hour continuing education class which will be offered on Saturday morning for Paramedics which will cover ventilators, 12 lead EKG, adult IO and advance airway management. Continuing education hours will be available for this course. This class is geared toward advanced EMT's and Paramedics.

CLASS 403:

BLOODBORNE PATHOGENS

This 3 hour class will be offered on Saturday morning ONLY. Class will start at 9:00am.

This course covers the requirements needed for First Responders, Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics to certify under the state or national registry. HIV, HBV, and HBC will all be covered during this class.

Certification is good for 10 years as long as you keep your original certificate.

AIRCRAFT SAFETY

BURN MANAGEMENT

HIGH RISK OB

SCENE MANAGEMENT

This 4 hour course will be held on Saturday afternoon and will cover aircraft safety, burn management, high risk OB and scene management from the air medical perspective. Continuing education hours will be available for this course. This class is geared toward the First Responder and EMT levels of pre-hospital care.

CLASS 405:

AIRCRAFT CRASH/RESCUE

This 4 hour course will be held on Saturday morning. This course will cover topics including what to do in the event of an emergency involving an air ambulance. Bell Helicopters will bring in an aircraft and explain methods of making the aircraft safe for the rescuer. This is an excellent course for Fire and EMS personnel alike.
